



AQUATIC OUTREACH







PROJECT UPDATES

Through the removal and/or displacement of invasive plants and the re-establishment of native species, these projects aim to encourage natural regeneration of local habitats and promote a resilient native plant assemblage for the future.

BLANKET CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK RESTORATION

With guidance from Shearing Consultants Ltd., and the help of **40 VOLUNTEERS**,

185 NATIVE PLANTS were planted in 2022.

Following restoration efforts in 2020 and 2021, CSISS watered the site weekly throughout the summer months. This fall, CSISS hosted a volunteer event focusing on education, indigenous storytelling and planting indigenous vegetation.

Support from BC Parks, allowed for the production and installation of an educational sign to provide information to park visitors about the restoration project (pictured below).





Little White Lake CSISS staff, Invasive Species Council of BC Stronger BC Team, and local volunteers DEADHEADED YELLOW FLAG IRIS SEED PODS AND FLOWERS.

CSISS completed detailed site inventory and post treatment monitoring for invasive yellow flag iris in sites around the Shuswap, including: White Lake, Turner Creek, McGuire Lake, Gardom Lake and Little White Lake

The Shuswap Trail Alliance crews, mechanically treated all infestations of yellow flag iris at White Lake(highest priority) Turner Creek and McGuire Lake.

The Invasive Species Council of British Columbia (ISCBC) supported the Project with Stronger BC Action teams completing work on both projects.
